## Social Work Program Requirements

The Social Work program is a sequenced program that requires four consecutive semesters to complete. All prerequisite courses must be completed prior to entry into the social work program. Students begin the program in the fall semester of an academic year; no social work student may begin the program in the spring semester. Students must a minimum grade of "C" in each program requirement; students who receive a grade of less than "C" in any course must meet with their program advisor to develop a plan for continuation in the major.

- 4. Upper Division Writing Course is highly recommended to be completed prior to beginning field placement courses in the second year of the SWRK program.
