

Access to education and resources for student success are crucial for prosperity. In Fresno, not everyone has the same access to the resources they need to be proficient and ready to achieve social mobility while others in Fresno are thriving.

Education

For the 2016-2017 school year, 74% of education spending meant for low-income, English language learners, and/or foster youth students allocated to all students instead.

Not only are there more math and English proficient students in Advantaged Neighborhoods, but there are nearly five times more college educated adults in Advantaged Neighborhoods than Southwest Fresno or "The Place".
